I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The North Carolina Consultative Services Bureau continued to undertake an active role in participating in the FY 2017 North Carolina OSH Strategic Plan. Consultative Services activities met or exceeded all current goals, while focusing on the strategic initiatives outlined in the performance plan in an effort to drive down the overall fatality rate along with injury and illness rates in North Carolina. Consultative Services continues to contribute in all areas of the performance plan as outlined below. This report covers activities funded under the 21(d) grant, which comprises approximately 75% of the total program activities. The broader state plan information for North Carolina is included in the State OSHA Annual Report (SOAR).

II. DISCUSSION OF RESULTS IN ACHIEVING CAPP PERFORMANCE GOALS

During FY 2017, the Bureau of Consultative Services continued to provide onsite services to the employers and employees in the private sector under the 21(d) grant. Consultative Services conducted a total of 1,395 visits, an 18% increase from 2016:

- 1,061 (76%) requested both safety and health; 291 (21%) requested safety only visits; and 43 (3%) requested health only visits.
- 1,160 (84%) initial visits; 135 (10%) training/assistance visits; 100 (7%) follow-up visits.
- Manufacturing visits 441 (38%), (NAICS 31-33)
- Construction visits 502 (43%), (NAICS 23)
- Other private sector industry visits 217 (19%)
- Hazards identified and eliminated as a result of consultative visits totaled 7,912 (FY 2016, 6,502). 7,415 (94%) were serious hazards.
- There were 278 private sector interventions conducted, 89 more than FY 16.

III. SPECIAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Safety consultant Rod Wilce presented at the National on-site consultation conference promoting SHARP construction participation.
- 166 private sector companies were participating in SHARP at the end of FY 17.
- Four construction companies were participating in SHARP at the end of FY 17.
- North Carolina has four staff with the certified industrial hygienist (CIH) designation and six staff with a certified safety professional designation (ASP or CSP). Two of the staff are dually certified.
- Silica calls for service and sampling are greatly increasing as expected. Consultants have more than doubled their work on the hazards over the past two years.
- Consultative Services participated in a video for the NC Forestry Association.
- Consultative Services was a big participant in the National Stand Down for fall prevention.
- Consultative Services mailed 968 letters to employers with an EMR of 1.5 or higher. Tracking last year's requests from the mailing, the bureau learned that 50% of customers no longer had an EMR above 1.5.
- NC identified and addressed overexposures to noise, zinc oxide, silica, and methylene chloride

IV. OTHER ISSUES OR ADJUSTMENTS

As predicted in the 2016 CAPR, the program returned to full staff during FY 2017. The increase in production reflects the strong staff. Unfortunately, due to lack of federal funding a position was lost for the FY 18.

V. INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAM

There is a system in place for any staff to initiate a change request upon noticing any provision that has gone out of date or needs updating for any reason. The complete text of our Bureau Quality Plan and Bureau Quality Operating Procedures is maintained as a controlled document on the Department's Intranet site. The Consultative Services Bureau continues to provide a quality system for auditing case files, hiring, training and supervising personnel. Consultative Services conducts quality meetings on as needed basis. CSB strives to provide efficient, effective and quality consultation services to all its customers. As predicted in the 2017 CAPP, there were no changes to the quality assurance program during FY 17. The program is operating smoothly at a high rate of production.
