## Ask the Director

**Question:** Do OSH employees have to submit proof of COVID-19 vaccinations if an employer requests it?



**Answer:** Yes, OSH Division employees must follow all reasonable host employer site entry requirements. This could include wearing certain types of PPE, taking a rapid COVID-19 test to enter the site and/or providing proof of vaccination status. If an OSH Division employee is unvaccinated and an employer requires vaccination records for those that enter the site, then the OSH employee should notify their supervisor. The supervisor can arrange for a vaccinated employee to be re-assigned to complete the OSH activity at the site..

# You Look Familiar, Have you Worked here Long?



## Meet Jim Dempsey

I was raised in the suburbs of Chicago and earned a BS in Engineering Science from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. I received a master's degree in Chemical Engineering from Penn State, where I met my wife. I worked in engineering at Caterpillar, Nortel, and BE Aerospace for most of my career and was involved in safety at various times, including working as a Safety Manager for a while.

Part of my industrial hygiene experience was working with chemicals. In my past work, I learned that many chemicals can be detected by smell before you become overexposed. However, isocyanates, in general, have an 8-hour PEL of 0.02 parts per million but the olfactory level, where people can first detect the odor, is nearly 20 times that. So, there could be significant overexposure without the person's knowledge. Some people may experience a singular response to the chemical and others can become sensitized so that any exposure causes symptoms, such as bronchitis and asthma. I had the opportunity to apply this information to a recent inspection.

As a Safety Manager, I became acquainted with the Safety Pyramid. Attitude issues can lead to unsafe behavior, which can lead to near misses, which can lead to accidents, which can cause injury or worse. A near miss is a chance to re-evaluate safety behavior. Learning about chemicals and accidents were factors that influenced my decision to join the NCDOL. OSH Division employees have a unique perspective as we see the whole destructive cycle on a regular basis. There is a huge cost to the family, the business, and society when someone has a debilitating injury or worse. I think that we have a crucial role and responsibility in educating others so that accidents don't happen.

I enjoy playing basketball, guitar, participating in track events in the Senior Games, and square dancing once a week with my wife. We have 4 children and 14 grandchildren. I love playing with my grandchildren and teaching them games I played as a boy. Our oldest son is a commercial pilot, and we receive flight benefits, which allows us to visit our extended family. My wife and I love to travel and have been throughout the United States, including Hawaii. We have also traveled to France, Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Brazil, Israel, Egypt, and Jordan together.

## Safety and Health Steering Committee Meeting

**Fire Extinguisher/AED Inspection Update** – The annual fire extinguisher inspection in the Labor Building and ORB were due in January. The Department of Administration (DOA) had determined that all fire extinguishers were due for the required 5- year hydrostatic testing and needed to be replaced with new fire extinguishers. Consequently, DOA will not place new tags on the fire extinguishers. Replacing the fire extinguisher will not be completed for a few months. The extinguishers are in operating condition and may be used if necessary. The Philips HS-1 (N5071A) model AEDs were included in a notification from the manufacturer regarding the pad adhesive. The manufacturer's notice explained that the adhesive of the pads appears to be separating but this does not affect functionality.

**NCDOL Hazard Reporting Tool Update** – The hazard reporting tool is on the Intranet. The tool is located on the main page under the Safety and Health Program tab. This is a fill in the blank hazard reporting tool. Users may also upload photos of the hazards. Reports will be sent to supervisors/managers as well as to Jiles to ensure that corrective action is undertaken.

**Emergency Evacuation Procedures** – After reviewing a weather alert and staff response it is advised that everyone makes themselves aware of the policies and procedures surrounding emergency announcements. Please make yourself aware of the fire and severe weather response and where to evacuate (external) to or relocate (internal) to. Floor monitors are available and will provide the lead in these situations. Floor monitors and two back up monitors have been identified to assure coverage in future events.

**ORB Odor Issue** - An initial odor in the building was found to originate from the sewer pump room being adjacent to the HVAC air intake which distributes air throughout the building. Then a subsequent odor was being produced by an odor cover, scent. A recommendation from the Facilities Management plumbing supervisor was that the pump room should be directly vented to the outside of the building. It is our understanding that the plumbing supervisor has submitted a work order to his management to complete this work, but it requires If approved, completion of the project will be contingent on funding.

**NC DOL Injury and Illness Update** – There had been four recordable injuries for the first quarter of the 2022 calendar year. One of these incidents required light or restricted duty, and that employee is now back to full duty. In total, there were three lost workdays for the quarter.

**Next Meeting** – July 12, 2022, 2:00 pm. This meeting is expected to be held as a mixed meeting allowing for in-person or virtual attendance. For the in-person attendees, the meeting will be held in the 3rd floor conference room in ORB.



# DOL staff have been out and about with various events in the past month

## Mid- Atlantic Logging and Bio Mass Exposition co-sponsored by the North Carolina Forestry Association

NCDOL had a booth at the exposition, in Hamlet NC, manned by ETTA and Consultative staff. They engaged with arborists and foresters during the Expo on April 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>. Andy Sterlen, Celeste Hardy and Bruce Pearson talked with attendees about safety and services that are available from NCDOL. They handed out approximately 100 quick cards at the event. This event brings together the leading suppliers of forestry equipment, products and services and it provides the attendees with the opportunity to explore live exhibits of products including the latest new equipment, Barko loaders, Feller Bunchers, Mulchers yarders, Harvesters, chippers, climbing equipment, chainsaws etc. Many small and large logging companies were in attendance, many bringing their families and competing in several skill competitions.



## Arbor fest

This is the first time that NCDOL has participated in Arbor fest. It was a successful event and NCDOL staff were well received. This was a 3-day event featuring world-class instructors, a huge demonstration area and the latest gear from the leading arborist equipment manufacturers. There were also indoor seminars and outdoor demonstrations.



# NCDOL Construction Forum

The NCDOL Construction Forum was finally able to start up again and was put on by NCDOL at the Neuse River Resource Recovery Facility in Raleigh on May 18<sup>th</sup>. This was a daylong event with speakers from NCDOL, the National Center for Construction Education and Research, Association of General Contractors, Barnhill Contracting, NC-811 Dig Safety, Safety and Health Council, Plumbing Heating and Cooling contractors of NC and Buckner Heavy Lift Cranes. There was a total of 26 people that stayed for the entire program and received a certificate. Several other participants came and left, as their schedules allowed.
