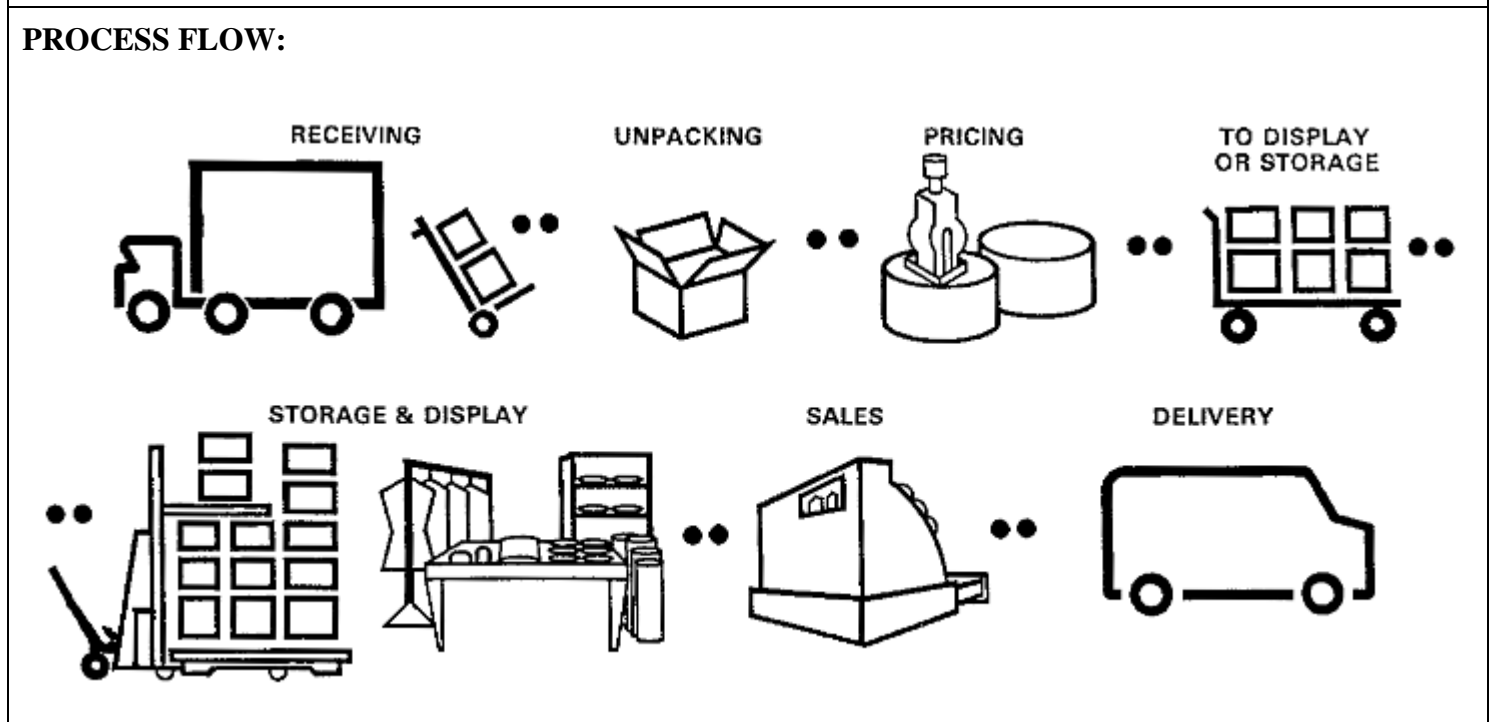

PROCESS DESCRIPTION: Department stores retail a wide variety of consumer items, including furniture, clothing, jewelry, sporting goods, etc. Stores usually buy in large quantities storing items on the sales floor and in separate warehouses. Recent trends are to display entire stock on sales floor and minimize storage facilities. Stock is received and unpacked, labeled for price and placed on display in the store on racks, tables, shelves or on the floor. Many items will be hand carrier by the customer while some items may be delivered by the store or carrier by private trucking firms. The majority of employees are in sales. Others include shipping, receiving and stock helpers; building maintenance and cleaning personnel; and delivery personnel.
